Medical Assistance PH-95 (Loophole)

It is very important to know that if a child has medical insurance from their parents that they can still apply for MA if the child has a disability that qualifies under the PH-95 (Loophole) category. The PH-95 Category is for children (under 18 years of age) with a disability. Family income does not affect PH-95 eligibility so if a child has a qualifying disability then they would be able to get MA under PH-95. It is important for a child to have MA in order to get mental health services (such as IBHS). Families will need to provide documentation, such as child's birth certificate, social security card, document of medical diagnosis, along with their income (even though family income doesn't affect eligibility). - Reminder that a child may qualify for Medical Assistance under the PH 95 or "Loophole" which is saying that they qualify for MA due to their disability and not for their families income.

Who can help with Medical Assistance Health Care Concerns?

<u>Special Needs Units</u> - Every MA provider has a special needs units. This is a person who can help and not a place to go. Families can call their special needs unit to get help with MA questions, to help find services, and to help change MA providers. Social Security Income



*Children can get SSI if they meet Social Security's definition of disability for children and if their family has little or no income. When children are under the age of 18 the family's household income could effect if they receive SSI but once the child becomes 18 then only their income would be considered for qualifying.

*Children 15 and older are able to work even when they receive SSI. Social Security has two programs that can assist young people who get SSI disability benefits and want to go to work:

- * Work Incentives Planning and Assistance (WIPA)
- * Protection and Advocacy for Beneficiaries of Social Security (PABSS) program

*** An important thing to know is that children who go into a PRTF program will either have their SSI put on hold or the family will only receive around \$30 while their child is in a placement. If the client is in a placement for a long period of time then the family might have to start the SSI process over again so this could be something you will need to help the family with if possible.

Children's Mental Health Services



- * <u>Family- Based Mental Health-</u> Family-Based Mental Health Services are designed to keep kids safe and living at home while helping parents/caregivers develop skills to help their children manage moods and behaviors. (The only children service that doesn't fall under IBHS)
- * Multisystemic Therapy (MST)- is an intensive family- and community-based treatment program that focuses on addressing all environmental systems that impact chronic and violent juvenile offenders -- their homes and families, schools and teachers, and friends and neighbors.
- * <u>IBHS-Individual Services (formally BHRS)-</u> It is a one-on-one program designed to transfer therapeutic skills to clients, their families/caregivers, and teachers in the home, community, and school settings.
- * <u>IBHS-Group and Individual Services (formally CSBBH)-</u> is a team approach model that complements school-district interventions, district prevention programs, educationally-based emotional and behavioral support programs, plus other types of community services such as 24/7 on-call and a case management component. This program is only in certain schools so you can check with a school to see if they have this program available.
- * I wanted to share all children's community programs available so then everyone is aware of what other services could be offered to the family if they need it.

Adult Mental Health Services



- * Outpatient Services- The outpatient clinic provides mental health evaluation, medication management, and therapy services for adults and children.
- * <u>Psych Rehab-</u> is a recovery-based program that assists individuals to develop, enhance, and retain skills in living, working, learning and socializing so they can live in, and participate in, the community. A structured curriculum provides the opportunity to learn and practice skills in a variety of domains.
- * Mobile Medication Management- Mobile Medication is a community-based program that provides inhome services to individuals who experience difficulty progressing in their mental health recovery due to inconsistent adherence to their medication regime. Nurses and technicians work with individuals and their prescribers to support self-management of their medications.
- * **Peer Support-** Peer Support is a program that provides individualized recovery-focused intervention to adults to enhance development of natural supports, coping mechanisms and other skills necessary to function as independently as possible in the community. Service is provided by certified individuals with a lived experience with mental health issues.
- * <u>Dual Diagnosis Treatment Team (DDTT)-</u> DDTT is a mobile service that provides intensive treatment to individuals with both mental health and intellectual/developmental disabilities. Referral to this service requires coordination with the assigned county representative for the individual. (Service for clients 16 and older)
- * Blended Case Management (BCM)- Blended Case Management is a supportive service in which workers engage in many activities designed to assist individuals living in the community. These can include accompanying clients to appointments, managing day-to-day activities, and serving as an advocate for the individual in care

Community Care Behavioral Health

CCBH has a wonderful website that has lots of useful information on it for IBHS staff as well as families. They have resources for wellness such as to quit smoking, substance abuse, eating healthy, and much more. You can also look up what mental health services are in each of your counties. You could follow these links to find services- go to website https://members.ccbh.com/ - click find a provider (at top of website)- search online- chose child or adult- type in zip code and countyclick mental health services (or you can find substance abuse services as well)next you will chose whether you want to find outpatient therapy, community services (which includes IBHS programs except for CSBBH since they are only in select schools), or Residential Services (PRTF and inpatient units). When you click on any of these services it will give you the agencies that provide this and the contact information. This could help you if you are trying to help a family find services if they are moving, if they are changing from one program to another, or if they need help with finding an inpatient unit.

Common Ground (Recovery Library)



Every client who has CCBH as there MCO is able to access the Recovery Library for FREE. I call this the "One Stop Mental Health Shop" as it has so many useful tools for families. I tell parents that Google is a scary place but the Recovery Library is always accurate and if they cant find what they are looking for then they can message them questions and will get answers back. This website has information to not only help the IBHS clients but also their parents. There is information on medications, support groups, physical health conditions, therapy tools, trauma, LGBTQ, and much more. The easiest way for families to find information is to go to the website and click the search button in the top right hand corner and type in what they are looking for. Then it will give them all of the information that has ever been posted on this website. This website is nice as it has trusted information on it that families would have access to it anytime they need it.

For families to sign up they will go to https://secure.ccbh.com/ePortal/login and click sign up, They will need their child's medical assistance number to create an account. They will then create a username and password.

Family Supports



Kinship- Kinship allows for the placement of a child with any individual, including a relative, who has met the regulatory requirements of a foster home and has a relationship with the child(ren).
