Read Across America Week begins every year on March 2 to celebrate the birthday of author Dr. Seuss. Barrett celebrated all week long with a variety of fun and educational activities. Retired teachers Roslyn Stulga and Kim Gennari teamed up with retired paraprofessional Lee Anne Doyle and students from the Middle School Student Government to run Dr. Seuss themed activities.

Later in the week was the Barrett Book Ball, which featured a twist on the national activity of "Drop Everything and Read!" The students stayed in their classrooms while the teachers read and dressed as their favorite picture book characters.
