Steel Valley didn't even need to complete a pass to win its sixth WPIAL football championship. The Ironmen defeated Beaver Falls 34-14 behind a powerful running game and a stout defense. Senior Cruce Brookins ran for 170 yards and scored three touchdowns. The Ironmen ran for 274 total yards as a team, with sophomore Donald Barksdale chipping in 84 yards and a touchdown. The championship was the first since 2018 for Steel Valley. The Ironmen also won WPIAL championships in 2016, 1989, 1988 and 1982


The win set up a date with Westinghouse in the PIAA Class 2A semifinals for a spot in the state championship game. The game was a defensive duel early on as Westinghouse led 6-0 at the half. Steel Valley took the lead early in the third quarter on a touchdown by Brookins, but Westinghouse pulled away to win 26-7. Steel Valley finished the season with an impressive 12-1 record.
