With a shift of their tassels and a countdown from senior class president Gabrielle Matusky, the Steel Valley Class of 2023 launched their caps into the air and took a giant leap toward the next stage of their lives.

The Steel Valley School District celebrated its 52nd annual commencement on Wednesday, May 31 at the William V. Campbell Athletic Field in Munhall. The recurring theme from those who stepped to the podium in celebration of the Class of 2023 was an appreciation for the district's sense of community, the support and guidance from inspiring teachers, and a recognition of the perseverence this class needed through its four years of high school.

Salutatorian Chelsea Bulger reminded her classmates to remember that life is unpredictable and that things don't always go as planned. However, they should look back at their journey through high school with a sense of accomplishment.

"Every student within the Class of 2023 should be proud of how far they've come," she said. "Each one of you has accomplished something very special on your academic journey. Your hard work paid off."

Valedictorian Brenna Kern praised her classmates for maintaining their spirit through an unpredictable four years of high school.

"From bedbugs, power outages, broken air conditioners, and a literal pandemic,

the Class of 2023 all persevered together," Kern said. "What I love about our class is that we strive to make memories. Even though we were online, hybrid and partially in-person learning, I think it's safe to say we made the most of our high school years together."

STEEL VALLEY SPOTLIGHT




A new generation has added their names to Steel Valley's storied rock wall.

Members of the Class of 2023 painted their names on the rocks on West Run Road in Munhall on Wednesday, May 31 prior to commencement. Their names joined those of the Class of 2022, who added their names last year in a revival of a tradition that dates back decades.

Alumni recalled that seniors traditionally painted the wall as part of the festivities during homecoming week. For one reason or another, the tradition went dormant in the early 2000s until its recent revival. But as the students let fly with their spray paint, passing cars honked their horns and passers-by shouted congratulations to the seniors.

Rick Gartska, better known to the kids as "Coach Rick," is a retired Bettis Atomic Power Laboratory chemist who lives in Munhall and volunteers his time conducting science investigations with Park Elementary 4th graders. Students participated in a wide range of investigations this year, including two forensic science investigations with the help of Sergeant Tichon, Park's School Resource Officer.

The first of these investigations focused on using blood analysis to solve crimes, and the second one focused on using fingerprints, footprints, and infrared ink to find the perpetrator (who in this scenario was a student in class). Coach Rick also planned a three-event mini-Olympiad that the students recently completed.
