


STEEL VALLEY SPOTLIGHT

Then they help guide two teams of students as they take the carts around the building, stopping at each classroom to see if teachers and staff would like to make a purchase.

Thanks to the incredible support of the Steel Valley staff, the entire project is self-sufficient. Supplies are restocked with the money the students bring in, and the funds also enable the students to enjoy a field trip at the end of the school year. Middle school students are able to learn multiple aspects of running the cart, picking up important life skills that will help them as they advance to high school and beyond.

Thanks to Tickets for Kids, 30 middle school families attended the Pittsburgh Zoo and PPG Aquarium on December 7 for their Holiday Zoo Lights. Students were chosen for their academic achievements in Math per grade level by their classroom teacher.
